#### Understanding Light Pollution ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS AND ACHIEVABLE REMEDIES

t Montana's Medicine Rock State Park, visitors have a rare opportunity to look up at the night sky and see an awe-inspiring display of planets and constellations, as well as the Milky Way, our spiral-shaped galaxy that contains about 100 billion stars, according to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. It is a magnificent sight, but those of us that live in or near cities with artificial lights beaming out of buildings and cascading over parking lots and highways may never get the pleasure.

"Because of light pollution, up to 80 percent of people living in North America are unable to see the Milky Way where they live," says Sabre Moore, executive director of the Carter County Museum, in Ekalaka, Montana. "Medicine Rock State Park is designated as an International Dark Sky Sanctuary, and the Carter County Museum has committed to safeguarding it in perpetuity".

The park's sanctuary certification was issued by nonprofit the International Dark-Sky Association, based in Tucson, Arizona, with a grassroots network throughout the world. The organization offers five dark-sky designations based on stringent outdoor lighting standards and relies on the help of community stakeholders, such as Moore, who serves as a volunteer dark-sky preservation advocate. At Medicine Rock, she helps host sky-parties for people to enjoy the celestial show and learn about the negative impacts of light pollution.

#### Threats Posed by Artificial Lighting

The skies around cities are hundreds, if not thousands, of times brighter than they were 200 years ago, according to 2017 research published in *Science Advances*. In addition to robbing us of the Earth's nocturnal skyscape, outdoor illumination negatively affects many plants and animals, including humans. Human-made lighting threatens approximately 30 percent of nocturnal vertebrates and 60 percent of nocturnal invertebrates, and it "is increasingly suspected of affecting human health," writes scientist Christopher Kyba, lead author of the report.

The mechanisms by which these life forms are affected vary. For example, when birds migrate, they fly into buildings that are lit up at night. Scientists estimate that at least 100 million bird deaths in the United States annually are related to light pollution. "Bobcats and bats rely on the cover of darkness for their survival and are also being affected," says Moore, adding that artificial light interrupts human circadian rhythms, thereby affecting our REM [rapid eye movement] sleep, which is vital for our well-being. The flight patterns of night-active insects are disrupted by outdoor lighting, which partially explains their declining numbers worldwide.

#### A Simple Switch Saves Turtles

It is possible to reduce these negative impacts, as the Sea Turtle Conservancy has proven. By getting people to modify the positioning and types of lights used in buildings along Florida and Texas beaches, the nonprofit has been able to rescue loggerheads, leatherbacks and green sea turtles from the brink of extinction.

Female turtles have evolved to instinctively lay their eggs on the beach, allowing the hatchlings to emerge at night and head toward the light of the horizon into sea. Humans, however, have interrupted this natural course with artificial light emanating from the windows of high-rise condominiums, garden spotlights and outdoor

#### Hope United Church of Christ Synopsis of Board Meeting October 10, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 7:03 p.m. by President Steve Nielson. Steve led us in prayer due to the absence of Pastor Meg.

<u>Those in attendance: Steve Nielson, Rick Cole, Terri Hillman, Ida Eckert, Nancy Michelson, Lori Sarnowski, Linda Parsons, and Linda Rehm</u>

Congregational Comments - Steve - None

Additions to the Agenda – Steve – Three additional reports to send to congregation for the proposed budget.

Approval of Agenda – Motion to approve the agenda as presented with the one addition was made by Lori Sarnowski with a second by Linda Rehm. Motion carried.

President's Remarks – Steve – Remind everyone to work on "How to Be the Church". The meeting next month will be at church at 6 pm. Dinner first followed by the meeting and discussion of our ideas on "How to Be the Church".

Approval of the September Meeting Minutes – Motion was made by Nancy Michelson with a second by Ida Eckert to approve the September meeting minutes. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report Last Month – Motion was made by Linda Parsons with a second by Lori Sarnowski to approve the report. Motion Carried.

The following items summarize the financial results for the month of September:

Statement of Operations – Income (Page 3):

- Weekly offerings for September 2023 were \$2,112 less than the amount budgeted but \$2,707 more than the amount received for September 2022. There were four Sundays in both years. Year to date Weekly Offerings were \$1,942 less than the amount budgeted but \$8,755 (\$214 per week) more than the same period in 2022. Year to date total Operating Income of \$156,621 is \$10,318 more than the same period in 2022.
- The only Investment activity for the Operating Fund consisted of \$4.74 in interest to the Money Market Account.

Statement of Operations - Expense (Pages 4-6):

• Total Expenses for September 2023 were \$691 less than the amount budgeted but \$1,571 more than the expense for September 2022. Year to date expenses were \$5,995 less than budgeted but \$12,809 higher than the same period in 2022. There was a loss (Income less Expense) of \$6,964 for the month compared to a loss of \$8,646 for September of last year.

Dedicated Accounts (Page 7):

• Dedicated Accounts had income of \$5,563 and expense of \$428 for the month, leaving a balance of \$93,024.

Building Fund (Page 9):

• Hope for the Future offerings received in September 2023 were \$75 less than the amount budgeted but \$185 more than the amount received for September 2022. Year to date Hope for the Future offerings were \$645 less than the amount budgeted and \$300 less than the same period in 2022. We have received Memorials of \$925 year to date.

Investments (Page 9):

• The securities account had a loss of \$9,522 in September as compared to a loss of \$18,975 for the same period in 2022. Year to date the securities account has a gain of \$19,180 compared to a loss of \$63,253 for the same period last year.

**Update of CEC Director – Pastor Meg:** This was tabled due to the absence of Pastor Meg for a family emergency.

**Three Additional Reports to send for the Budget Meeting on October 29<sup>th</sup> – Steve:** We will have copies available on the 15<sup>th</sup> at church. We will have Callie email these items to the regular email recipients of the Beacon. Also have Callie mail the regular mail recipients of the Beacon. Steve will attach a short paragraph regarding the Parking Lot to the budget pages. Motion was made to approve these reports going to the Congregation by Linda Parsons and seconded by Nancy Michelson. Motion Carried.

**Update regarding the parking lot – Steve:** The Parking Lot Committee approved Hutch Paving and the amount of the parking lot repair cost. The Committee recommends giving the deposit to secure cost. The Committee was given a verbal guarantee of the price by Hutch Paving that price would remain the same if done next spring providing deposit is made. At the October 29<sup>th</sup> meeting in addition to finalizing the 2024 budget we will ask congregation to approve the Parking Lot Contract cost, approve the giving of the deposit and if all is approved, establish a Task Force for Fund Raising. It is hoped to begin the project next May.

**Update for Trunk and Treat – Steve:** Saturday, October 21, 2023, from 2 to 3 pm. There will be a Photo Booth and water and juice boxes will be available.

Pastor's Report - Pastor Meg: No report was received or reviewed due to Pastor Meg having a family emergency.

The Operating Fund had a loss of \$23,042 for the first nine months of 2023. This compares to a loss of \$20,550 for the first nine months of 2022. Total Operating Income of \$156,621 was \$10,318 more than the same period last year. Total Operating Fund Expenses of \$179,663 were \$12,810 more than the same period last year.

Operating Fund Regular Offerings of \$144,903 were \$8,628 (\$221 per week) more than the same period of last year. In the first nine months of 2023, we also received Special Offerings of \$1,285 for Easter, \$355 for Christmas, \$2,240 for Energy, \$75 for Other (primarily Mother's & Father's Days), and \$525 for Church Growth. Mission Offerings for the period included OCWM - \$555, One Great Hour of Sharing - \$495, Neighbors In Need - \$30, Christmas Fund - \$260, and C.U.E/Olivet - \$245.

In the first nine months of 2023, the Building Fund had total Income of \$32,935. Hope for the Future (Regular) Offerings of \$12,830 were \$300 less than the amount received for the same period last year. 2023 Special Offerings of \$925 were \$2,545 less than the same period in 2022. There was a September 2023 year-to-date Investment Account gain of \$19,180 versus a loss of \$63,253 during the first nine months of 2022. Building Fund expenses were \$7,741 which was \$2,151 higher than the same period in 2022.

During the first nine months of 2023, Dedicated Accounts received \$24,953 (Good Samaritan \$645, Blessing Bags – Pets for Vets \$578, Senior Youth Group \$355, Food Pantry \$19,525, Special Gifts to Church School \$574, Ukraine Relief \$320, and Women of Hope \$2,956) and had expenses of \$11,369 (Good Samaritan \$1,108, Blessing Bags – Pets for Vets \$578, Senior Youth Group \$142, MCREST \$200, Food Pantry \$7,003, Special Gifts to Church School \$1,545, Ukraine Relief \$320, and Women of Hope \$473).
