⁷ Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. 1 John 4:7-8

Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day are both on February 14th.


We are doing something completely different in 2024!




Monthly Report From HOPE Food Pantry...

On January 13, 2024, we held a drive-thru distribution day. We served 94 households, which includes 335 individuals. 8,200 pounds of food, and cleaning supplies were distributed.

According to an article posted in January of this year, via https://www.sciencealert.com/ sustainability-5-practical-tips-to-make-your-life-greener-in-2024, there are 5 Practical and Affordable Tips to Make Your Life Greener in 2024. I will highlight 3 of those tips that I deem most important.

- Eating: Considering how much food we throw away each year. Food waste is said to often generate methane, a greenhouse gas that is more potent than carbon dioxide, according to https://www.carbonbrief.org/food-waste-makes-up-half-of-global-food-system-emissions/. A few tips listed via the sciencealert.com website that can help you eat more sustainably are as follows: 1) Eating less meat and more plants, especially beans and greens. 2) Going meat-free for one day a week. 3) Preplanning your meals and eating leftovers reduces waste immensely. Following these few tips is a good start and will get your foot in the door when you have established a goal of making your life greener.
- 2. Traveling: Since traveling is a necessity, it is good to find ways to ensure that we find balance in sustainable travel. The article mentions active travel, which is choosing to walk as well as bicycling, which are greener options that can keep ourselves and our children healthier while producing no carbon emissions. The article also recommends replacing a car trip or two with active travel options, if possible.
- 3. Energy Use: We must admit, we utilize lots of energy, which at times seems inevitable. The article points out how expensive our home energy usage is becoming and how significant our usage contributes to greenhouse gas emissions. Most of us know by now that turning off lights when leaving a room helps preserve energy use immensely. Four other tips listed are as follows: 1) Cook food with the saucepan lid on. 2) Wash clothing at colder temperatures. 3) Unplug microwaves and chargers when not in use. 4) Replace broken halogen light bulbs with more efficient LED versions. These tips are stated to make a huge difference to both our bills and our household emissions, according to the

What is Lent? Why do we observe it in 2024?

Lent is a special season in the church! Lent is a time to prepare for Easter.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. It lasts for 40 days, not counting Sundays. Lent ends at sunset the night before Easter Sunday. Sundays are considered "little Easters.".


The word "Lent" comes from the Old English word l*encten*, which refers to there being more hours of daylight and the season of spring.

Lent is not mentioned in the Bible; however, it is a biblical tradition to have a time of preparation before every important religious celebration.

Lent is a time to examine our thoughts, feelings, and actions to help us find ways to grow in our faith. Lent is a time to renew our commitment to God.

During Lent, we remember the life of Jesus. We remember that Jesus taught us to love and forgive one another.

Some people give things up during Lent, like sweets or a favorite activity, as a way of honoring God. It is also a time to let go of behaviors that have taken on too much importance, like being online, or behaviors that impact us negatively, like gossiping. The early church taught that giving up something was a way of recalling the great sacrifice that Christ made for all people. More recently, people have added on extra activities like reading their Bible, participating in a study, or finding additional ways to help people. Adding an intentional spiritual practice is a healthy way of growing and following the teachings of Jesus.

Hope United Church of Christ Synopsis of Board Meeting January 9, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m. by President Steve Nielson. Pastor Meg led us in prayer.

Those in attendance: Steve Nielson, Rick Cole, Terri Hillman, Ida Eckert, Nancy Michelson, Lori Sarnowski, Linda Parsons, Linda Rehm, Jerry Rogers, and Jim Wilson.

Congregational Comments: Steve – None

Additions to the Agenda: Steve - Add to New Business - Chili Cookoff Update

Approval of Agenda: Motion to approve the agenda as presented with the one addition was made by Linda Parsons with a second by Ida Eckert. Motion carried.

President's Remarks: Steve – Welcome back to everyone. Hope you all had a nice break and good holidays. Looking forward to working with this Board and the New Board.

Approval of the November Meeting Minutes: Motion was made by Lori Sarnowski with a second by Ida Eckert to approve the November meeting minutes. Motion Carried

Treasurer's Reports for November and December: Motion was made by Lori Sarnowski with a second by Rick Cole to approve the reports for both November and December. Motion Carried. Only the December 2023 report is shown below:

The following items summarize the financial results for the month of December:

Statement of Operations - Income (Page 3):

- Weekly offerings for December 2023 were \$3,831 more than the amount budgeted and \$6,850 more than the amount received for December 2022. There were five Sundays in 2023 and four Sundays in 2022. Year to date Weekly Offerings were \$3,532 more than the amount budgeted and \$14,779 (\$269 per week) more than the same period in 2022.
- The only Investment activity for the Operating Fund consisted of \$4.25 in interest to the Money Market Account.

Statement of Operations - Expense (Pages 4-6):

- Total Expenses for December 2023 were \$1,816 less than the amount budgeted and \$1,529 more than the expense for December 2022. Year to date expenses were \$6,497 less than budgeted and \$3,045 less than the same period in 2022. There was a gain (Income less Expense) of \$5,333 in December 2023 versus a loss of \$650 in December 2022.

Dedicated Accounts (Page 7):

Dedicated Accounts had income of \$7,041 and expenses of \$4,175 for the month, leaving a balance of \$96,495.

Building Fund (Page 9):

Hope for the Future offerings received in December 2023 were \$275 more than the amount budgeted and \$435 more than the amount received for December 2022. Year to date Hope for the Future offerings were \$945 more than the amount budgeted but \$5 less than the same period in 2022. December year to date Property Expense was \$32,741 more than the amount budgeted. This variance was driven by Engineering/Surveying costs earlier in 2023 plus a \$30,000 contract deposit paid in December for the parking lot repair planned for Spring 2024. We have received Memorials of \$1,255 year to date.

Investments (Page 9):

The securities account had a gain of \$10,916 in December as compared to a loss of \$8,433 for the same period in 2022. Year to date the securities account has a gain of \$42,317, recovering a significant portion of the \$49,087 loss for the same period last year

New Business

Nominating Committee – Jim Wilson: Four will be running: Nancy Faye, Nancy Burnham, Terri Hillman, and Kirk Schoenherr. Nancy Faye and Nancy Burnham do not want to be on Executive Board. Cindy Greening would have liked to run but has not been a member of Hope Church long enough to run.

Set Annual Meeting Date – Steve Nielson: Sunday, February 25, 2024, at 11:15 a.m. in person only in the Fellowship Hall. Would like to have childcare available so all parents of young children could attend. Will ask the older kids to help out.

Set Final Date for Committee Reports – Steve Nielson: January 28, 2024, is the recommended date with February 4, 2024, as the absolute latest date to turn in reports. This is needed to give Calley time to get the Annual Report assembled and gotten to the congregation timely as this will be her first year preparing this report. An e-mail blast will be sent to all the Committee Chairs.

Audit Committee – Steve Nielson: Norm Nenninger, Bob DeGryse, and Carl Frank will be on the Committee and they will be joined by Terri Hillman. A date has not yet been set but hopefully the 1st or 2nd of February.

Housing Resolution – Terri Hillman: The housing portion of Pastor Meg's compensation has been changed from \$25,000 to \$30,000 this year. Just the mix was changed. There will be a variance of allocation on the budget reports. The church has no liability. Pastor Meg has to justify this allocation with the Internal Revenue Service. A motion was made to approve the Housing Resolution by Linda Parsons, with a second by Ida Eckert and an abstention by Jim Wilson. Motion Carried.

Review of Advent Season – Pastor Meg: Pleased with the Concert by the Motor City Chorale. Steve is working to have them in the spring and next advent season. Pastor Meg is keeping track of families that light the Advent Candles. Since such a small turnout at the Blue Christmas Service, in 2024 it will be prerecorded and online only. She was very happy with the music by the Bells and Choir, the toy drive, and the sock drive. Hanging of the greens and taking down of the greens had good participation. The one service on Christmas Eve was successful. Possibly next year will return to an 11 p.m. service but would need commitment to make that happen.

Upcoming Lenten Season – Pastor Meg: There will be a Grief and Loss Group starting on Wednesday, January 24, 2024, at 10:30 a.m. and running for six to eight weeks. There will also be a Lenten Series based on a book study via zoom beginning Monday, February 19, 2024, in the evening. She did not mention how many weeks this would last.

Ash Wednesday is on February 14, 2024, which is also Valentines Day. In the past, there has been a morning continental breakfast with the tables set up in a cross. The last few years the church was open from 4 to 6 p.m. to get ashes and prayers. Would we want to do something to combine Ash Wednesday and Valentines Day? Combine the season of Lent with the love of Valentine's Day. Possibly a lasagna, salad and bread dinner, and short worship service in fellowship hall that would be family friendly with starting time of about 5:30 p.m. Lori Sarnowski and Steve Nielson both liked the idea and would attend. Pastor Meg will ask other people.

There will be the **Petting Zoo** on **Palm Sunday** with breakfast that day as well. Then there will be **Maundy Thursday**, **Good Friday**, and **Easter Services**.

Pastor's Report - Pastor Meg:

Worship: Advent was full of worship services. Besides Sunday worship, we had the Christmas pageant, Blue Christmas, and Christmas Eve. We had 13 families participating in the pageant, with a total of 23 youth aged 10 weeks to 17 years. It was wonderful to have so many people participate in worship. Blue Christmas had more people watching online, so next year we will prerecord Blue Christmas service and have it online only.

Pastoral Care: I continue to meet with people as needed for spiritual guidance and support. The holidays are difficult for people dealing with grief.

Church Business: Calley worked her first Advent/Christmas season at Hope. She did an excellent job keeping track of all the necessary communications and worship services.

Spiritual Council: The group met in December to prepare the sanctuary for the worship services. We are meeting with Daniel, the representative from the church directory company, to put together the new church photo directory.

Christian Education: I am still preparing lesson plans and gathering supplies. Jordan and Kristin are faithful teachers. We are advertising for a new person to fill this position. Unfortunately, the person we had hired was not a good fit.

DMA & Conference Upcoming Involvement: I have stepped down from the DMA Linking so that I can give more time to the Committee on Ministry. Rev. Dr. Diane Baker and I have agreed to co-chair this group. The work of COM is very important, as we work to ensure the health and vitality of the UCC.

Community Outreach: Both AA and PFLAG sent us Christmas greetings. The food pantry continues to be a valuable way of reaching out to our neighbors in need. The updated website allows visitors to find us and learn about our church.

Consent Agenda Items: Steve received reports from the Technology Committee and the Property Committee. He also received an Email from Susan Winters adding Rick Cole to the Christian Mission and Witness Committee. Motion was made by Jim Wilson with a second by Lori Sarnowski to accept these reports as submitted. Motion carried.

These items are not for discussion. They are for review purposes only. The Board will accept them as presented. If, however, a discussion is needed, a trustee can make a motion to remove them from the consent agenda for further discussion.
