WORDS OF HOPE



"Those who walked in the dark have seen a bright light. And it shines upon everyone who lives in the land of darkest shadows." Isaiah 9:2

Most of us find joy in decorating our homes for Christmas. We take out our treasured decorations and delight in the memories they hold. Growing up, every year we carefully unpacked the old nativity set and placed it under the Christmas tree. Over the years, the figures became chipped. Sheep were missing legs, and the cow had only one horn. By the time I was in high school, our original three wise men had been reduced to just two, the third one lost in the attic. The infant Jesus had teeth marks from the family dog acting as if the plastic savior was a chew toy.

However, our little nativity set never lost its ability to fill us with a sense of expectation. We never talked about buying a new perfectly enacted set. We never considered purchasing one that was a valuable collector's item. I wonder if unconsciously there was something about its missing and damaged parts that was a source of comfort. After all it was familiar, and the reality of its imperfection reminded us of the need for Christmas, the need for love to enter our hearts once again.

Angels and wise men. Shepherds and stars. It never occurred to us as children that the cast of characters were mixing images of two different nativity accounts in the gospels. Only in Luke's Gospel is there a manger and shepherds. The crowded inn and wise men and a brilliant star belong only to Matthew's narrative. The birth narrative is not even mentioned in the gospel of Mark or John! What mattered to us was not the biblical or historical accuracy of the details.

What mattered was the power of the story to rekindle our sense of wonder and to stir our hearts. Along with strains of "Silent Night" playing softly in the background, our family nativity set reminded us, every winter of our lives, of the simple birth of a baby who provided the foundation of our faith. The light and hope of the world given to us in the darkest of seasons. Through that well-worn nativity we embraced the gift of love born in a stable and born in our hearts each year.

May the blessing of the Light of the World bring you a deep sense of wonder and love this Advent!

What is Advent?

The Christian New Year begins on the first Sunday of Advent. Advent ends and Christmas begins on Christmas Eve. Christmas lasts for twelve days, ending on Epiphany, January 6th. This is what we commonly called the 12 days of Christmas. Epiphany is the celebration of the Magi following the star and finding the Christ child and worshipping him.

The time before Christmas, is Advent, a season of preparation for Christmas. Christians prepare for the birth of Jesus by remembering the history of the Jewish people's deep longing for a Messiah. In Advent, we reflect on our own deep need for a savior. Christ was born not to be a royal ruler available only to the elite but instead to connect with all people. Christ was not a warrior but instead humbled himself as a servant. The word "Advent" comes from the Latin word adventus, which means "coming" or "visit."

If you're unfamiliar with Advent, I expect it might feel odd to think of the weeks before Christmas as something more than Christmas time. Advent doesn't get much attention compared to Christmas, though interest in Advent is growing steadily in many churches and in many Christian homes. That's not to say all Christians are excited about Advent. Some Protestants ignore Advent because it isn't taught in Scripture.

What Colors Are Used in Advent?

There are a few other things about Advent, besides its themes, that you might find odd if you didn't grow up celebrating Advent. We associate Christmas with the typical Christmas colors of red, green, white, silver, and gold.

Advent, on the other hand, features purple (or dark blue) and pink. The purple/blue color signifies seriousness, repentance, and royalty. Pink points to one of the themes of Advent, which is joy. For many observers of Advent, the first, second, and fourth Sundays of Advent are "purple/blue" Sundays. Only the third is a "pink" Sunday. The pink candle stands out to remind us that, even as Advent helps us get in touch with our somber yearning for God to come to us, we rejoice in the knowledge that God came to us in the person of Jesus.

What is the significance of the different Sundays?

In most protestant denominations, the first Sunday of Advent, we recognize the hope found in the birth of Christ. The Second Sunday, we focus on Christ as the Prince of Peace. The third Sunday, we rejoice in the joy that Christ came to be the savior for all people. The fourth Sunday of Advent, we turn our attention to the gift of love that God gave to the world through the birth of Jesus. On Christmas Eve, we light the Christ Candle which represents Christ as the center of our faith. There is no absolute right color scheme of Advent. The Christ-candle is white and usually taller than the other candles signifying both purity and importance. Most advent wreaths are circular which symbolizes the unending, unbroken love of God. Evergreen branches are used on the wreaths to symbolize growth and everlasting life.

During this season of Advent may we allow ourselves to reflect on the gift of God's unconditional love that comes to us through the birth of Jesus.




Reverse Advent Bags will be available for pick up starting on **Sunday December 1st.**

Whether you have a love for coffee, enjoy baking, or simply take pleasure in serving others, we would greatly appreciate your help.


We are looking for volunteers to help with organizing and cleaning up the coffee area, as well as providing refreshments for our weekly coffee hour fellowship.

Pastor Meg is looking for people to get together to go to the see the movie about Bonhoeffer that is currently in the theaters. Some church leaders have loved the movie and others have criticized it. This is the true story of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a man who preached love while plotting the assassination of an evil tyrant. The movie depicts the life of Rev. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German Lutheran theologian who is one of the best-known Christian martyrs of the 20th century. After two years of imprisonment, Bonhoeffer — an outspoken critic of the Nazi regime — was executed on April 9, 1945.

Bonhoeffer's reputation as a scholar, however, does not rest on his heroic death. His 1937 volume "The Cost of Discipleship," a study of the Sermon on the Mount, is renowned as a classic of modern theological writing.



Even though many food wrappers look like foil, most are made of plastic.

*Try buying in bulk and using reusable containers to store on-the-go snacks.

Plastic Beverage Bottles

In the sun and salt water, plastic bottles become brittle and break into smaller pieces.

* Opt for tap water or fountain drinks in a reusable bottle.

Breakdown Time: 450 years

Forks, Knives & Spoons

Volunteers collect enough utensils—more than half a million in one day—to host a picnic for every resident of Washington, D.C.

* Entertain with reusable forks, knives and spoons made from bamboo or recycled plastic.

Fishing Gear

Abandoned fishing gear can trap and harm ocean life long after it is lost or discarded.

 Don't leave your fine behind; participate in a fishing-line recycling program.

Breakdown Time: 600 years

Cups & Plates

Foam cups and plates cannot be easily recycled and often crumble into small pieces.

 Grab a reusable mug that can go from coffee to smoothie with just a rinse

Breakdown Time: 50 years



Straws/Stirrers

Volunteers collect enough straws and stirrers in one day to line California's 840 mile coastline.

 Next time you're out, politely refuse plastic straws or carry your own reusable straw.



Bottle Caps

Plastic bottle caps are one of the most commonly found items in the stomachs of sea birds.

Keep your bottle caps to use for art projects or on-the-go games. Checkers, anyone?

Cigarette Butts

The most common item found during beach cleanups, cigarette filters are actually plastic.

 Properly dispose of cigarettes in receptacles or use a portable ashtray.

Breakdown Time: 1-10 years



Takeout/Takeaway Containers

Volunteers collect enough containers in one day to get takeout for breakfast, lunch and dinner every day for 858 years.

* Reuse these containers for tomorrow's leftovers or other storage needs.



Plastic grocery bags pose high risks to sea turtles when they mistake them for their favorite food, jellyfish.

*Toss reusable bags in your backpack, purse or car so they are handy for every trip to the store.

Breakdown Time: 1-20 years



Hope United Church of Christ Synopsis of Board Meeting November 12, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 7:06 p.m. by President Steve Nielson. Pastor Meg led us in prayer.

Those in attendance: Pastor Meg, Steve Nielson, Nancy Burnham, Terri Hillman, Kirk Schoenherr, Linda Parsons, Linda Rehm and Lori Sarnowski. Absent: Jerry Rogers and Nancy Fay.

Congregational Comments - Steve Nielson - None

Additions to the Agenda – Steve Nielson – None

Approval of Agenda – Motion to approve the agenda was made by Nancy Burnham with a second by Kirk Schoenherr. Motion carried.

President's Remarks – Steve Nielson: As done the past few years, suggested we not have a meeting in December due to everyone's busy schedules. Board agreed. He thanked all of us for the past year and has enjoyed working with everyone. He is leaving tomorrow for five days to hunt down Bambi.

Approval of the October Meeting Minutes – Motion by Nancy Burnham with a second by Lori Sarnowski to approve the October minutes. Motion Carried.

Treasurer's Report for October 2024 – Motion was made by Linda Parsons with a second by Kirk Schoenherr to approve the report for October. Motion Carried.

The following items summarize the financial results for the month of October:

Statement of Operations - Income (Page 3):

- Weekly Offerings for October 2024 were \$4,331 less than the amount budgeted and \$5,714 less than the amount received for October 2023. There were five October Sundays in 2023 and four Sundays in 2024. Year to date Weekly Offerings were \$3,878 less than the amount budgeted but \$81 (\$2 per week) more than the same period in 2023. We also received Special Offerings of \$305 for Energy and \$550 for Neighbors in Need in October.
- The only Investment activity for the Operating Fund consisted of \$0.45 in interest to the Money Market Account.
- Year to date Operating Income, comprised of Weekly Offerings plus other Income accounts, is \$2,762 less than the amount budgeted but \$74 more than 2023.

Statement of Operations - Expense (Pages 4-6):

- Total Operating Fund Expenses for October 2024 were \$1,109 less than the amount budgeted and \$990 less than the
 Expenses for October 2023. Year to date Expenses were \$10,335 less than budgeted and \$423 less than the same
 period in 2023. Year to date favorability to the Expense budget is primarily driven by the open Christian Education Director
 position and associated Christian Education costs, as well as lower heating cost. That favorability is partially offset by
 higher electricity and grounds upkeep costs, office supplies and administrative expenses, and cost associated with
 increased church life activities.
- There was a loss (Income less Expense) of \$3,053 in October 2024 versus a gain of \$2,668 October 2023.

Dedicated Accounts (Page 7):

Dedicated Accounts had income of \$3,613 and expense of \$6,222 for the month, leaving a balance of \$94,526.

Building Fund (Page 9):

 Hope for the Future offerings received in October 2024 were \$955 which was \$95 less than the amount budgeted and \$465 less than the amount received for October 2023. We have received Memorials of \$3,410 year to date. Final invoices for the parking lot repair were paid in July bringing the total paid in 2024 for the repair to \$107,456.

Investments (Page 9):

 The securities account had an October loss of \$2,232 compared to a loss of \$5,608 for October 2023. Year to date 2024, the securities account had a gain of \$39,683 versus a gain of \$13,573 for 2023.

New Business

Tree Trimming – Steve Nielson: Due to concern over some of the trees on our property, Norm Nenninger contacted Davey Tree Expert Company to get their recommendations. Since Norm is planning to have the building power washed and sealed in the spring, part of the recommendations should be attended to now. The tall Arborvitae's on the corners and front of the building have grown to the extent they are rubbing on the building and these trees present an obstacle to the power washing process. Also, the trees along Garfield have grown in a way that they block the sight line of the church sign from the north (traveling South on Garfield). There are also trees in the rear of property that have had ice and wind damage and need attention.

After Christian from Davey Tree and Norm walked our property together, Christian gave us the following recommendations and proposals: prune the Arborvitae's and six trees along Garfield at a cost of \$910.00. On his inspection he found a thorny Hawthorn tree in the back of property that has large sharp spikes that could propose a hazard to anyone walking or brushing against the branches and he therefore suggested removing it. The cost for pruning the trees in the back and removing the Hawthorn tree would be \$1,820. If we decided to do both of these items at the same time, the price would be \$2,470.00 instead of \$2,730.00 if they were done separately (a savings of \$260.00). A stump would remain after removing the Hawthorn which could be ground up for an additional \$320.00. Steve volunteered that he and his family could take care of the stump for free if we decided to have Hawthorn removed.

Steve told us we had until November 24th to make a decision on the proposals. After some discussion by the Board members, a motion was made by Linda Parsons with a second by Terri Hillman to accept the bid offer from Davey Tree Experts to do all the work now at a fee of \$2,470.00. Motion carried.

Nominating Committee – Steve Nielson: Steve requested a Board member be on this committee. Nancy Burnham volunteered. Steve mentioned that Rick Cole and Ida Eckert will also be on the committee. There will be five positions needing to be filled. Steve Nielson, Linda Parsons, Linda Rehm and Lori Sarnowski all have to come off the Board. Jerry Rogers does have the option to run again but does not want to run again but concentrate on his health and family. There was some discussion of some possible candidates for these vacancies. A motion was made by Kirk Schoenherr with a second from Nancy Burnham to form the Nominating Committee of Nancy Burnham, Rick Cole and Ida Eckert. Motion carried.

Insurance Update – Nancy Burnham: She had our Safe Church Policy reviewed by Terry Watmore who is an attorney who found a few little items needing correction or clarification due to the new insurance rules. The Sunday School leader needs to know who is picking up a child from the classroom. Every employee as well as all teachers and those working with the toddlers or youth must have a file including a criminal background check. The teachers and those working in the classrooms will need to undergo online training prior to our new insurance policy. Those undergoing the training will receive a certificate to put in their files.

CEC Committee Update – Pastor Meg: She has contacted four individuals to be on this committee. They are Jessica Hazelton, Carissa Spear, Kristin Miyamoto and Jordan Miyamoto. Nancy Burnham made a motion with a second by Lori Sarnowski to approve these four people to be on the CEC Committee. Motion Carried. The first meeting will take place in January 2025.

Pastor Meg has made a place in Fellowship Hall for the kids to play during Coffee Hour instead of playing in the Youth Room.

Spiritual Council Update – Pastor Meg: They met and would like Linda Smith to serve Hope Church as the Sunshine Lady. They would also like to recommend to the Board that Linda Smith serve as a member of the Spiritual Council. Kirk Schoenherr made a motion with a second by Linda Parsons to approve Linda Smith as a new member of the Spiritual Council. Motion carried.


